

Half Day City & Temples

€ 30 P/P

Daily: 4 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 12:30 hrs / or Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

One of the most popular tours, bringing you along 3 of the most stunning temples, Bangkok has to offer! It features the “Wat Traimit” with its 5, 5-ton heavy Golden Buddha Image, the Wat Chetuporn (commonly known as the Wat Po), that boasts the over 45-meters long Reclining Buddha. Wat Pho is also regarded as the first centre of public education and is sometimes called ‘Thailand’s first university’. Mural paintings, inscriptions, and statues found in the temple-educated people on varied subjects such as literature, warfare, archaeology, astronomy, geology, meditation and to be considered, home of the Thai traditional massage. We end the tour with a visit to the Wat Benchamaborpit (also known as the Marble Temple): a representation of an outstanding success of marriage between Italian Carrara marble and classical Thai architecture. Especially for those interested to know a bit more about Buddhism and its history, combined with the always-busy city life.

Grand Palace

€ 35 P/P

Daily except Sunday: 3 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 11:30 hrs / or Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 16:00 hrs)

A visit to the Royal Grand Palace, the nation’s landmark and most praised royal monument in Thailand is a must. The former royal residence of the Chakri Kings, the palace is the perfect example of an ancient Siamese court. Built in 1782 by King Rama I, it was the centre of power for more than 150 years. Today, the palace is Bangkok’s major landmark and most popular tourist attraction.

Wat Phra Kaew, the Temple of the Emerald Buddha, is located right next to the Grand Palace together form perhaps the greatest spectacle for the visitor to Bangkok. Despite the fact that the whole compound is so full of tourists you spend half the time trying to avoid getting in people’s photos, it’s still pretty amazing place to visit. It consists of over 100 brightly coloured building, golden spires and glittering mosaics, and dates back to 1782, when Bangkok was founded. When you enter the compound, you first of all see Wat Phra Kaew and the nearby attractions, and then move on to the Grand Palace afterwards. Photography is permitted in the Royal Palace Grounds and in the compounds of the Emerald Buddha Temple, but not inside the buildings.

Dress Code: Participants on this tour should note that the chapel is a national shrine and you will be required to wear proper attire (no bare shoulders, knees or strapless-heel shoes). Shoes must be removed before entering the temple buildings as a matter of respect.

City & Temples with Grand Palace

€ 50 P/P

Daily except Sunday: 4 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 12:30 hrs / or Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

This tour embodies a combination of 2 very popular half-day tours inside bustling Bangkok. It features the “Wat Traimit” with its 5, 5-ton heavy Golden Buddha Image, and then pass through Bangkok’s China Town with its typical red-painted gold shops. Visit the Royal Grand Palace, and then go through the dazzling Wat Phra Kaew with its revered Emerald Buddha, Golden Chedi, and Pantheon of the Chakri Kings and the Eight Coloured Towers. Next on the program is the Wat Po with its Reclining Buddha image. Wat Pho is also regarded as the first centre of public education and is sometimes called ‘Thailand’s first university’. Mural paintings, inscriptions, and statues found in the temple-educated people on varied subjects such as literature, warfare, archaeology, astronomy, geology, meditation and to be considered, home of the Thai traditional massage. We end the tour with a visit to the Wat Benchamaborpit (also known as the Marble Temple); a representation of an outstanding success of marriage between Italian marble and classical Thai architecture. 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Klong (Canal) Tour

Daily: 4 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 12:30 hrs / or Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

Nineteenth-century Bangkok was laced with canals, giving the capital the designation ‘Venice of the East’. Surviving canals and the Chao Phraya River (River of Kings) provide memorable vignettes of a traditional waterborne way-of-life that has remained essentially unchanged over the centuries. The river and canals may be conveniently explored by public transport or via a traditional long tailed boat. We finally end at Wat Arun (Temple of Dawn), this famous Chao Phraya riverbank landmark, diagonally opposite the Grand Palace, is best known for a porcelain encrusted 79-metre central pagoda which sparkles in the sun. After a wonderful tour, we bring you back across the river to the main starting point.

Klong (Canal) Tour with Grand Palace

Daily except Sunday: 4 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 12:30 hrs / or Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

Experience a half day trip along the bustling Chao Phya River and the quiet Klongs (canals) in a long tail boat enjoy scenes of life by water. We bring you to a more traditional way of living, more serene and traditional, away from all the high-rise and modern buildings of Bangkok City Centre, as we gently pass Thonburi residential areas. A stop will be made at the “Temple of Dawn” (officially named Wat Arun). A visit to the Royal Grand Palace, the nation’s landmark and most praised royal monument in Thailand is a must. Situated close to the Chao Phraya, Bangkok’s River of Kings, the palace occupies nearly one square mile. The former royal residence of the Chakri Kings, the palace is the perfect example of an ancient Siamese court. Built in 1782 by King Rama I, it was the centre of power for more than 150 years. Today, the palace is Bangkok’s major landmark and most popular tourist attraction.

Photography is permitted in the Royal Palace Grounds and in the compounds of the Emerald Buddha Temple, but not inside the buildings.

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The Crocodile Farm

€ 30 P/P

Daily: 4 hours (Afternoon 13:00 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

Take a drive out of the city centre of Bangkok and head down to the Samut Prakan Province and visit the biggest crocodile farm in the world and watch a daredevil show between man and beast, romping around with crocodiles, handling them with sometimes only their bare hands. Founded in the 1950-ies, you can view over 10,000 of these fascinating creatures from tiny babies to full-grown giants. The whole complex can be admired via an elevated covered walkway. Besides the crocodiles, there is also a nice little zoo, with road shows featuring trained elephants and monkeys.

Ancient City

€ 40 P/P

Daily: 4 hours (Morning 08:30 hrs – 12:30 hrs)

See one of the world's largest outdoor museums of over 300 acres, which contains over 100 replicas of Thailand's famous authentic wooden villages, renowned temples and markets, following Thailand's geographical outline all the way from south to northern Thailand. Called "Muang Boran" – Ancient City – also houses several ethnological displays of artefacts and antiques. Rural arts, ancient tools, and hunting equipment, evidence of the long-term survival of a native culture. You will see the most outstanding recreation of Thai architecture, history and way of life. Thailand can be – in this way - even quickly visited in a much shorter time!

Floating Market

€ 30 P/P

Daily: 4 hours (Morning 07:30 hrs – 11:30 hrs)

This most, interesting half-day tour takes you to the rural yet world-famous floating market of Damnern Saduak, situated around 100 kilometers west of Bangkok. It is generally known as Klong Ton Khem Floating Market or Damnern Saduak Floating Market. Damnern Saduak has officially three floating markets. A narrow canal flanked with food stalls and souvenir shops forms the principal market at Ton Kem. Photographers at Ton Kem will get their best shots from the bridge, which crosses over the canal, and from the produce shed on the right. Nowadays, the market is bustling with activity from very early in the morning until about 11.00 am. For those who want to buy some memorabilia here, be mindful that you bargain!

FULL DAY EXCURSIONS: Lunch Included

Floating Market and Rose Garden

€ 65 P/P

Daily except Tuesday/ Wednesday: 10 hours (07:30 hrs – 17:30 hrs)

This most, interesting full day tour takes you to the rural yet world-famous floating market of Damnern Saduak, situated around 100 kilometres west of Bangkok. The tour includes a visit to Nakorn Pathom; site of the highest Chedi in Thailand called "Phra Pathom Chedi, which is the largest pagoda in Southeast Asia. An excellent international buffet lunch will be served at the picturesque Rose Garden Aprime Country Resort. Afterwards, you will attend the Thai village show at the Thai Village, giving you a short introduction into the many customs of Thai life. The show includes the colourful Buddhist ordination procession, an elegant fingernail dance, a Thai boxing demonstration, Hill Tribe dance performances, sword-fighting, elephants at work, charming folk dances and a traditional Thai wedding ceremony and much more.

Ayuthaya by coach/ or return by cruise

€ 60 P/P

Daily: 9.5 hours (07:30 hrs – 17:00 hrs)

A full day tour, bringing you to visit the former capital of Thailand, Ayuthaya, situated approximately 75 kilometres north of Bangkok and one of those destinations, you have to see. The mixing of cultures in Ayuthaya began in the mid-16th century when ships from Ayuthaya plied the Asian seas, trading with neighbouring countries. When the Dutch began showing up in the 17th century, Ayuthaya became a port city and trade routes were extended to China, Japan, Indonesia, Portugal, Holland and France and up to the Scandinavian countries later. Although the ancient villages of foreign traders lining the Chao Phraya riverbanks were abandoned when the city was sacked by Burmese troops in 1767, some remnants survive to showcase the cities past glory. The tour starts at the Summer Palace of the late King Rama V), commonly known as "Bang Pa-In", which is another touch of beauty. You continue to the magnificent ruins of early splendour that Ayuthaya is famous for all over the world. We will pass or visit all the most impressive ruins of this World Heritage Site for taking sufficient pictures. Lunch will be served at a local restaurant in Ayuthaya. We return to Bangkok by coach, where we will bring you back to your booked Bangkok hotel.

Note: Kindly be aware that proper attire is required to enter the Summer Palace compounds; our representative will be pleased to advise you accordingly.

River Kwai

€ 50 P/P

Daily: 9.5 hours (08:00 hrs – 17:30 hrs)

This tour takes you to the world famous bridge on the River Kwai, built during World War II by the prisoners of war. The bridge is located near the town of Kanchanaburi, 130 kilometres west of Bangkok. You will visit the well-kept Wat Cemetery of Allied Prisoners, which contain the graves of an estimated 9,000 Allied soldiers who lost their lives while building the bridge and constructing the notorious "Death Railway" which the Japanese had hoped to stretch all the way to the Burmese border. This tour will bring you also closer to the past, as paying a visit to the JEATH Museum (the name "JEATH" is derived from Japan, England, America/Australia, Thailand and Holland), where the past has been created and relived with pictures and artefacts out of this time. Of course, a train ride over the original Death Railway track is enclosed in this excursion while a sumptuous lunch awaits the clients upon arrival at the disembarkation station along the railway track. We will return back to Bangkok in the late afternoon to your booked hotel.
